# Charlotte County Sheriff's Office Bureau of Detention

# Year End Report



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## *A Message from the Commander*

The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office Bureau of Detention consists of Jail Operations, Civil Services, and Court Security. The Bureau is dedicated to providing safety and security for all citizens of Charlotte County. The Bureau of Detention returned to normal operations on April 3, 2023, following the Pandemic challenges that affected Housing and Programming Services from 2020. The Bureau successfully remained flexible to implement programs while providing a safe environment for the inmate population.

In accordance with Florida State Statute, the Charlotte County Jail is required to undergo a scheduled Florida Model Jail Standards (FMJS) Inspection on a yearly basis to ensure minimum standards regarding the supervision, care, custody, treatment, housing, and general handling of the inmate are being met. On May 18, 2023, our facility was inspected by an FMJS Inspection Team and met standard requirements. An unannounced inspection took place on September 12, 2023, and the FMJS Inspectors substantiated a meets standard of the requirements.

Every three years federal regulations require our facility to have an auditor perform a PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act) Audit. During July 10-12, 2023, a PREA Auditor corroborated that there were no violations and multiple standards were exceeded.

In addition, triennially the Florida Corrections Accreditation Commission (FCAC) performs an onsite assessment of the Charlotte County Jail. Our last assessment was held November 2-4, 2021, and reaccreditation was recommended. On February 23, 2022, the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office was awarded reaccreditation status for the Detention Bureau by the Commission.

The Bureau of Detention has continued its contract with the U.S. Marshal Service to house federal inmates. This contract brings in additional revenue to the county and reduces taxpayer support for detention operations. We are able to accommodate our local needs as well as offer services to other agencies that may benefit from our facility.

The following information has been compiled to give an overview of the Bureau of Detention for the year 2023.

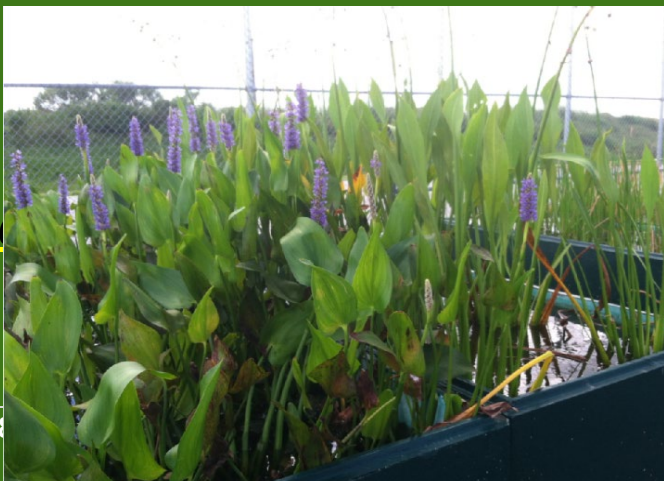
